I had the privilege of leading Sunday school for our 5th and 6th graders (God Squad) this fall. As we discussed the many reasons we come to Immanuel each Sunday, the joy of meeting each other in this special place, and the message of love and acceptance that we carry with us when we leave each week and enter back into active lives at home, school, and work, we recalled the origin of our church's name—Immanuel, and the deep meaning it has for us in our lives as we experience both the certain joy of creation as well as the sadness of loss and grief in death.

In Hebrew, the name broken down to its roots by scholars, informs us that "Im or [with], nu [us], el [God], or Immanuel, appears two times in the Old Testament -first in Isaiah and again in Matthew. In Isaiah, the prophet foretells the miracle of Christ's birth and speaks of Mary, who will bear a son and will call Him Immanuel.
