Last year I experienced a non-life threatening but life-altering medical issue that gave me new context for how God works all things for good, no matter what! This most recent trial is the most trying medical issue I have experienced, and it strengthened my relationship with God and my family.

I have been diagnosed with ulcerative colitis which is caused by an auto immune deficiency in my body. This has impacted what I eat and drink, how I exercise, and how I deal with stress in general. Foods that I have enjoyed for years are now restricted and some of the adrenaline producing stress that I have thrived on for years needs to be better managed.

I have seen God through her medical research, doctor visits, prayer, and hugs. The love we share has been strong and it has grown stronger because of this trial!

While the long-term treatment is stable, there continues to be some uncertainty. But I know one thing that is rock solid — God loves me and I love Him. While trials are never fun, this one is perfecting my faith and through it, will help me be reflection of God's love not for my benefit, but for the benefit of those he puts in my path, and that is a wonderful thing to be joyous about!
