He is the reason!

Treasurer's Report

It is with God's guidance and the support of the talented Immanuel staff and council that I was honored to serve this past year as Treasurer of Immanuel Lutheran Church. The financial condition of the Church remains strong thanks to the continued faithful and generous giving from the congregation.

2021 General Fund

In 2021, Immanuel's annual income, which includes weekly envelopes, loose offering, special offerings, miscellaneous income and fees totaled \$1.49 million. Total income for 2021 was higher than budget by approximately \$274K, primarily due to miscellaneous income items. The funds received under the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) of \$144K were forgiven in 2021 and recorded as income. Further, Immanuel received over \$75K related to the Employee Retention Credit. When excluding these items, total income for 2021 was approximately \$54K higher than budget.

Expenses for the year were below budget, as church activities continued to be impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Total expenses in 2021 totaled \$1.17 million against a budget of \$1.21 million (under budget by \$42K).

Here are some highlights of expenses in 2021:

- Benevolence of \$212K against a budget of \$202K were given to the ELCA and ministry
 partner organizations as directed by the Social Ministry Committee. 2021 benevolence
 includes the additional 1% discussed at last year's annual meeting and was provided to
 the ELCA at the time of the PPP loan forgiveness.
- Personnel expenses totaled \$780K against a budget of \$811K slightly below budget with some shifts in staffing during the year.
- Program spending was less than planned, with total expenses of \$57K compared to a budget of \$65K.
- Properties expenses were slightly less than budgeted. Total expenses were \$77K compared to a budget of \$82K.

Overall, 2021 results were strong with income exceeding expenses by over \$320K, bringing the General Fund cash reserves to over \$475K. The Council recommends contributing an additional 1% in benevolence to be paid in 2022 and to maintain the remaining cash as reserves in anticipation of continued uncertainty in 2022.

The Audit Committee completed its annual review of certain policies, procedures and financial information in January 2022.

Capital Campaigns in 2021

The Building Up campaign continued in 2021 with strong giving against campaign pledges throughout the year. Total gifts of \$148K were received in 2021 related to the capital campaign. At the end of 2021, almost 100% of pledges have been received in support of the capital campaign, representing cumulative gifts of \$631K, compared to total pledges of \$634K.

2022 Proposed Budget

The Council is proposing a balanced budget of \$1.28M for 2022, which represents giving consistent with 2021 (excluding the miscellaneous income items related to the PPP loan and Employee Retention Credit). Uncertainty remains as we head into 2022, however, some spending is planned that is consistent with pre-2020 levels.

Key components of the expense budget:


- Personnel expenses are budgeted to increase to \$840K compared to \$780K in 2021, which includes a 3% salary increase for staff.
- Program expenses budget is \$71K. While this represents an increase from \$57K spent in 2021, this reflects spending consistent with pre-2020 program spending levels.
- Property costs are expected to increase by over 30% over 2021 spending to \$104K. This
 is largely driven by increases in insurance costs and return of repair and maintenance
 costs to pre-2020 spending.
- Immanuel remains committed to giving a significant portion of our Weekly Envelopes, Loose Offerings and Special Offerings in benevolence to the ELCA and our partner ministries selected by the Social Ministry Committee. In 2022, we recommend benevolence giving of \$209K, which represents 17% of gifts. This percentage is consistent with the 2021 budget.

The 2021 budget recommendation was finalized after prayerful discussion and reflection as to what is necessary to continue to fund our ministries while managing our costs to ensure that we remain financially healthy, with acknowledgement that we expect continued uncertainty in 2022. We believe that this budget will enable us to continue our vision of reaching deeper into our congregation and further out into our community.

Thank you to the entire congregation for your generous and faithful giving in 2021 and to our staff and council members for their responsible management of God's Gifts to Immanuel.




No Counting Team again this year, but please; if you would consider helping every couple of months, it would be greatly appreciated.

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Adult Faith Formation Sara Bonk

Throughout Adult Faith Formation programs in 2021, we celebrated God with us as we gathered to have fun, to learn more about our faith and to serve others. Christ worked with us as we expanded our understanding of the Bible and figured out how to teach and learn together — whether sitting at a computer or a folding chair at church or standing six feet apart. And we served as the Spirit loved through us, in traditional and in new ways, in groups and individually. Covid may have paused or changed a few church routines, but it makes us more grateful for the opportunities and experiences we were blessed to enjoy.

Wednesday Evenings - Grow in Faith

Programing was paused the first half of the year but in September Pastors Angela and Paul began facilitating a weekly video series presented by Dr. Craig R. Koester of Luther Seminary. *Genesis to Revelation* is a book-by-book analysis of the Bible from the perspective of literature and narrative. Lectures and live discussions are accessed online or in-person. Adult Faith Formation partnered with Justice Ministry to offer guest speakers between lecture modules to dovetail with themes discussed in lectures. The series has been well attended both in person and online and continues through 2022.

Seniors Actively Living Today (SALT)

The group (55+ adults but open to anybody interested) continued to meet online, in-person or both at least once a month throughout 2021. Outside speakers and SALT members presented and led discussions on climate change, Black history, the history of women and the vote, women in the Lutheran church, the Koran versus the Bible, a Russian travelogue to list just a few topics. In December the group toured the Norwegian House and Mindekirken, the 100-year-old Norwegian Lutheran Memorial Church in Minneapolis. In 2022, look for more interesting events and discussion topics to be offered.

Women's Ministry

It was difficult to plan big group events when it wasn't safe to be together in person most of the year. However, in mid-August a small group of women enjoyed a canoe trip in the Boundary Waters, just before the area was closed due to fire danger. In November, participants served at Humanity Alliance where meals are prepared and delivered to food-insecure families in Hennepin County, Carver County, and other nearby communities. This was an initial contact for Immanuel with this MN-based non-profit and with whom we hope to continue to serve. Also in November, Immanuel women and their guests enjoyed a theater outing to the Old Log in Excelsior to see "The Play that Goes Wrong" which was really funny; even with vaccination cards and covid masks. Future plans include a Woman's Retreat fall of 2022.

Women's Bible Studies

Small group studies continued with strong participation throughout the year. For a description of the studies and current information, visit the Immanuel.us website.

Women's Service and Outreach

The Piecemakers quilting group continued to assemble quilts in spite of setbacks due to Covid. Unable to meet during the fall of 2020 and much of 2021, they met during June and July 2021 and completed 62 quilts which were donated to Lutheran World Relief. The group started up again in September and already have finished over 60 quilts. They will continue to meet every other Thursday until May when the quilts will be displayed in church during the second weekend. New volunteers are always welcome!

Volunteer knitters and crocheters of The Prayer Shawl Ministry did not gather in person in 2021 but continued to create prayer shawls that were blessed and then distributed to the sick, grieving and those in need of prayer. Baptism prayer shawls were also given to all those baptized during the course of the year.

Men's Ministry

Five men went to the BWCA and had a great trip (getting out 15 minutes before the BWCA was closed due to fires!). Men are invited to another BWCA trip, August 14 - 20, 2022. And two teams of Immanuel guys played ball in the Eden Prairie Summer Softball League, Thursday Men's Church Doubleheaders. Immanuel men served breakfast regularly at the Simpson House homeless shelter in Minneapolis and will continue to serve in 2022. If interested in volunteering, David Beach will be the interim contact during staffing transitions. Men's Bible studies continued to meet twice a week — effective Jan. 4, 2022, the Tuesday group meets via Zoom. The Thursday group continues to meet in-person at the Chanhassen Legion, 7 a.m.

Library and Book Club

Our church library continues to offer a variety of books to borrow ranging from devotionals and theology to current events and popular fiction. Immanuel's Book Club continues to have strong participation (10+), meeting monthly either in-person or reluctantly on Zoom.

Fellowship Committee Bill & Lesley Greep

Greetings from the Fellowship Committee. In 2021 most Fellowship activities were again derailed by Covid. We are still unable to host the annual meeting chili fest, Sunday morning coffee or Wednesday night meals. We are looking forward to being able to bring back these activities again in the coming year.

This year Fellowship was able to assist with the root beer & ice cream tent at the Prop Bingo event in September. After a challenging year it was wonderful to see people gather outside under the tent and support a worthwhile organization.

The highlight of 2021 for Fellowship was the annual Welcome Sunday picnic in September. In 2020 we were forced to cancel the event, but in 2021 we held the event outside under the tent. Instead of the traditional potluck food we served burgers, hot dogs, chips, cookies and potato salad. The event was well-received, and many people commented how much they enjoyed being outside and the easier clean up.

The Fellowship Committee is grateful for all the faithful volunteers and to MaryKay Copp for her help. We are looking forward to the return of more social events, coffee service and Wednesday night meals in the coming year. Thank you all for your continued support and prayers. May 2022 be a year filled with hope and fellowship!

Middle School Youth Ministry Phil Weber and Kim Whalen

When Immanuel confirmation programming needed to change once again due to rising COVID cases this past fall, Martin Rathjen remarked, "I can't imagine facing life without Christ." Thanks to Martin, Paul Erdmann, our adult confirmation leaders, student leaders, Pastors, parents, and our entire Immanuel community – we don't have to. Due to the relentless efforts of all these people, we continued to deliver the good news of Christ to our Immanuel youth. As a result, these precious young people have been able to face life with Christ over these many evolving and challenging months. Prevailing messages of hope and grace have allowed our youth to endure the hardships and to persevere. As a parent of one of Immanuel's confirmation students, the profound importance of faith formation and the confirmation passage was summed up recently when our 14-year-old daughter asked if we could attend the 10 p.m. Christmas Eve Candlelight and Family Blessing service. For years it has been my wife and I doing the shepherding. This year, our daughter was the shepherd. She, and many others are the beneficiaries of Immanuel's consistent message that Christ is in their lives and walks with them always. Our youth ministry staff has tirelessly fought to encourage and bless our youth with this message. In doing so, they have helped equip them with resilience, wisdom, and compassion.

Wednesday evening confirmation classes this past year occurred predominantly via Zoom along with Refuel – the 20-minute pre-opening incorporating music, singing, prayer, and meditation. The new year was marked by a special presentation in January by mental health experts from Lutheran Social Services. Counseling experts discussed the challenges of the past year with students and engaged them in conversation about their experiences as young people trying to navigate the pandemic and helped them identify strategies in an effort to remain resilient. As gatherings became possible following availability of the vaccine to both adults and youth, Immanuel was able to transition to in-person worship this past March and gradually open its doors in September for in-person confirmation classes with masking and social distancing measures along with the option of virtual participation via Zoom. Opportunities for fellowship and growth during the annual tubing and skiing outings this past January and February as well as the *Youth Rejoicel* Pancake breakfast and late spring garage sale were postponed due to limited gatherings imposed by COVID. It is exciting to know that many of these events are being planned for 2022, beginning with tubing and skiing opportunities scheduled in the weeks ahead.

The confirmation retreat was held at Immanuel from Oct 29-31, allowing students to return to their own homes each night for sleeping as we did last year. Students enjoyed many opportunities to connect with each other and with God, including campfire devotions and serving together at Feed My Starving Children. Guest leaders Agape* (Dave Scherer) and Joe Davis used joyful music, poetry, activities, and messages to encourage our confirmation students to Show Up and to let God's justice flow, ending with a fun and inspirational Sunday morning hip hop worship. We anticipate returning to an overnight retreat at Camp Onomia in November 2022.

Another activity that remained in the Twin Cities this year for COVID-related reasons was the middle school mission trip. In tandem with the Immanuel high school mission trip, middle school students enjoyed fellowship while serving at the homes of senior citizens in the Hamline/Midway neighborhoods in St. Paul, cutting down small trees, pulling weeds, and even cleaning out an entire garage. They also helped repackage medical supplies to ship to other countries, package vegetables to be distributed at low cost to communities in need, and pack books to be given to children through hospital programs. Our Immanuel youth were truly Called to Care and Sent to Serve, and they also enjoyed eating lots of ice cream!

Middle School Report Continued-

It has been a great pleasure to support Immanuel's youth ministry this past year, and we look forward to continuing to serve our youth as we enter into the new year. We ask for your prayers to uplift, enliven, and encourage our youth in their pursuit of this awesome journey of faith and life in the weeks and months to come.

Properties Committee Mark Arvidson

2021 was a busy and productive year for Immanuel Properties. Several projects were completed, with some just getting underway.

- Spring & Fall yard cleanup was completed once again with the help of many faithful
 volunteers. We focused on shrub trimming, leaf collection and completed a major clean-out
 of the Holding Pond. A big thank you to Ryan Brattensborg (Rembrandt Landscapes) for his
 donation of time and a large leaf mulching machine. A new garden shed was also installed
 that provides better storage for the gardening crew as well as the snowblower during the
 winter.
- Thanks to your generous contributions to the Building Up capital campaign, we were able to
 install new windows in the sanctuary. The windows were beginning to degrade and the wood
 was becoming soft and rotting in many areas. All the lower exterior windows were replaced
 with quality commercial aluminum windows and they are an appealing upgrade to our
 sanctuary.
- New gutters were installed on the east side of the sanctuary.
- All fire extinguishers were replaced following our regular fire suppression inspection.
- Two landscaping projects were completed by Ron Nemec's Landscaping company:
 - Removed the overgrown junipers on the east side of church and replaced with new appealing shrubs that will be easier to maintain.
 - Planted shrubs between the Columbarium & parking lot, providing more privacy for that area.
- Two Troop 347 Eagle Scout projects were completed:
 - Three new picnic tables were built under the leadership of Owen Wurscher and they're now a welcome addition by the firepit area.
 - The old storage shed has been refreshed and renovated: replaced bad flooring, installed new metal soffits, filled all holes/gaps, installed additional shelving, and painted the exterior.
- We will be moving forward in the Spring with a project to restore the Holding Pond into an
 appealing landscape with minimal maintenance. It will include native grasses & pollinator
 wildflowers and will be similar to the holding ponds in Round Lake Park. We received grant
 funding from the Riley Purgatory Bluff Creek Watershed District and the City of Eden Prairie
 that will cover most of the costs.
- We're currently working with a local artistic welder to review a proposal and drawings for an
 updated design for the baptismal font. Our goal is to provide a refreshed space that will also
 prevent the past water leaking issues. We're hoping to receive final approval to move
 forward in early 2022.

It's been a fun and satisfying year being a part of this group and none of the above could have been accomplished without the many volunteers from our church community. I especially want to thank Tammy Vergeront for her overall leadership of all the church properties, Darrell Fusaro for his daily care and maintenance of the property as well as the Properties Committee of Tom Totall, Brad Kingsley, Scott Anderson, Brian Heinzen and Ron Nemec.

Senior High Youth Lisa Ross and Kate Brooke-Beyer

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." -Jeremiah 29:11

You can find this verse on the website for Feed My Starving Children (FMSC), one of the places where our Immanuel Youth had a chance to serve this year. The site goes on to say that God's children everywhere will face trials, and God will be right there to provide hope and strength as they live through these trials. Fortunately, during yet another year of instability in 2021, the Senior High youth program provided many opportunities to encourage the kids that God is there walking right beside them.

The students were reminded that God was there walking with them at Wednesday night large group Refuel and also during confirmation small groups. Our leaders, Martin Rathjen and Paul Erdmann, worked tirelessly to provide a hybrid confirmation plan on Wednesday nights in order to keep God's light burning bright. There were large meeting spaces or outdoor venues provided to meet in-person while others joined online from their homes. Each Wednesday night begins with Refuel which provides music from the Holy Commotion group. This group consists of many Senior High Youth and brings everyone together with moving songs. The Holy Commotion group, the confirmation students, the adult guides and the many student leaders were able to feel God's love through the music that Lori Hanken directed for 7 years. She recently resigned her position at the end of 2021 and will be missed! Fortunately, the Lord has provided a new Holy Commotion Director, Dennis Wallisch, so the music will go on! In December, Refuel was moved back to Luther Hall so everyone could continue to connect altogether. We have 64 confirmation students this year, 7th-9th grade, 33 student leaders, 10th-12th grade, and 15 adult guides working with our confirmation students.

Another reminder of God's plans was shared with youth who chose to take part in a local Twin Cities mission trip. In June, twelve Senior High and Middle School Youth came together to go out into the community and work together to spread God's love. They served the Twin Cities community in a variety of ways: yard work, cleaning out a garage, washing windows, packing backpacks full of school supplies, packing boxes of medical supplies, and working in a garden that provides food for those in need.

This year, eighteen 10th graders were able to be confirmed in person on Oct. 24th. They shared expressions of their faith and were able to celebrate the many ways they have grown in their faith during the 3-year Confirmation program at Immanuel. After students are confirmed, they are invited to continue to live out their faith by choosing to become a Student Leader while in 10th-12th grade. This year we have 33 total student leaders including 10 new Sophomores, 11 Juniors and 12 Seniors. We are blessed to have their leadership for the Confirmation students.

The Confirmation retreat was onsite this year again and provided another chance to dive deeper into God's word through song, activity, justice workshops, scripture and also a service project at FMSC. Sixty-five students and student leaders participated in the retreat with the theme titled "Let Justice Flow"- Amos 5:24. The retreat guest: Agape (Dave Scherer) shared God's love for the whole world by combining rap, dance, and storytelling. In Greek, "Agape" is used to describe God's unconditional love ("For God so loved the world" – John 3:16). Throughout the weekend, the participants were able to make critical and much needed connections during mealtimes together, campfire devotions and night games. Some Senior High Youth were able to share their own personal stories of faith, growth, and how God has worked in their lives. We pray for all these kids to know that God has plans for hope and a future for them.

Senior High Youth Report Continued-

In November, our Senior High Youth had an opportunity to sign up to participate in this year's Minneapolis-based National Youth Gathering (NYG). It had been scheduled for 2021 but was postponed until 2022 due to the ongoing pandemic. NYG only happens every 3 years and it typically welcomes 30,000 ELCA Lutheran youth from across the country. It is exciting that Immanuel has a group of youth signed up to go.

The past year has presented challenges for so many youth. Sometimes they feel alone, sad and possibly scared. Please continue to join us in lifting our youth up in prayer so they can feel supported. God will help us through the unthinkable; we were never meant to handle it alone.

Worship, Music & Arts Winnie Lindstam

Immanuel...God With Us!

What an amazing year. Thank you to all the staff and volunteers at Immanuel who offered their time and talents... even in a Pandemic. A big thank you to our Minister of Music, Clark Weyrauch for his leadership, creativity, humor and joy throughout these challenging times.

- Throughout winter and spring, music was in the air either with small groups at church, or via technological magic - the adult choir members recorded their specific singing part, which Clark consolidated into wonderful on-line anthems.
- Jeong Lee, who became Organist/Accompanist in 2020, had her first full year at Immanuel, and continued the strong Immanuel tradition of stellar piano and organ music.
- Other highlights:
 - A small group of singers and instrumentalists presented a Tenebrae service for Good Friday (*Hope in the Shadows*), in the empty sanctuary to the on-line congregation.
 - Summer came, and the pandemic waned...at least for short while. The once-a-month Choir music was performed in the Sanctuary, as well as at the Fall Kickoff Tent service, where the Church honored Gary Thrasher, our prior Music Minister.
 - As the pandemic raised its ugly tentacles in the Fall, the Choir (including some new members!) continued singing throughout the rest of 2021 – fully masked.
 - In the Fall, Dennis Wallisch, became our Servant Song Director, and he has added new features to the Contemporary Service. He has also taken on leadership of Holy Commotion with the retirement of Lori Hanken.
 - O In addition to the Adult choir, the Bell Choir and instrumentalists of all stripes added to our services, especially in the Fall and Holiday times. The children's Epiphany and Ascension Choirs practiced the first 10 minutes of Sunday school and sang in church a couple of times. And the Cornerstone choir began practicing again in the Fall. Many thanks to the leadership of Christina Orton, Tom Getchius and Barb Savereide.
 - Saturday night services began again in the Fall. Thank you to Joan Meyer for her continued musical support on the organ.
 - As always, the dedicated Altar Guild group faithfully provided communion, dressed the altar, prepared for baptisms, as well as arranged the flowers that beautifully adorned the sanctuary.

Annual Report of The Senior Pastor Pastor Paul Nelson

(Love bears all things believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things: love never ends. 1st Corinthians 13:7)

I have found great comfort in words of enduring hope and love over the past 2 years. For a number of reasons, mostly the Covid pandemic, we have experienced more doubt and division, more anxiety and uncertainty, more fear and frustration this past year. We began the year with news of vaccines and a hope that life would return to normal, but we are still waiting on that, experiencing another surge as I write this.

We have needed the renewing blessings of hope and comfort that God's love brings these past months. Our ministry theme for 2021, RENEW 52, raised up those great gifts we share. During that year we encouraged one another to attend to our faith in practical, tangible ways each week. Our ministry theme for this past year "Made new!" has continued that theme of renewal, this year focusing on God's comforting promises and the daily work of the Spirit to renew our spirits.

This second year of Covid and the impact that has had on our life together has been a challenge. In some ways, this has been the most challenging periods of time I have experienced in ministry. We cannot gather face to face in the same old ways we previously enjoyed and took for granted. We are all dealing with increased anxiety over an unknown future. We live in a society that is as divided and divisive as it's ever been. All this stress and divisive tension takes its toll.

At the same time, also been one of the most rewarding times in ministry. It has been inspiring to see how you, the people of Immanuel, have remained connected to and supportive of our ministry. I have been inspired by the faithful, graceful, hopeful ways our staff has led ministry despite the challenges we have faced. And I am blessed by the abundant love of God we have shared and continue to share, love that has made all the difference in enduring these challenges.

Worship at Immanuel continues to be a blessing of comfort and encouragement as more people attend in-person and on-line than before the pandemic. I am grateful for the ways we can connect, the technology that makes this possible, and most of all for the faithful people who volunteer to help produce, livestream, and record our worship. A highlight of this past year was our outdoor worship that ran each Sunday from Memorial Day into October. Families, visitors, and even pets enjoyed this alternative, safe, option for worship.

There have been several personal highlights for me in ministry this past year. We expanded our Bighorn backpacking trip to two weeks including a back country option, two-day hiking weeks, and a family camp opportunity. Over 50 people, young and old, grew in faith and friendship while enjoying the inspiring beauty of God's creation. Immanuel held not one, but two Bingo benefits for PROP this past year, an online bingo event in February, and our Big Bingo Benefit in the tent this past September, raising nearly \$4000 for PROP. Our tent meeting, while not quite the busting-at-the-seams kick off it has been in past years, felt like a return to close to normal with a full tent and enthusiastic worshippers. Our Wednesday night Adult Faith Formation offering of the bible study, Genesis through Revelation, has attracted over 50 participants who have been inspired by this excellent study. Tables of 8 attracted nearly 90 people who are sharing their faith, food, and growing friendships. Thanksgiving and Christmas services were, for me, some of the most inspiring experiences I have ever had in worship, perhaps because the hope, gratitude, and promise they celebrate are needed more than ever. Our pastoral caring team, led by the efforts

of our wonderful Parish Nurse, Kari Totall, has also stepped up our efforts to regularly connect with those in need, making regular calls and providing as much care and support as we are able. I know I am blessed by those visits as much as those who are being visited.

I am particularly humbled by and grateful for your faithful generosity. In this uncertain time, the people of Immanuel have remained faithful, thanks be to God. I pray daily that we will be faithful and generous in such a way that our neighbors are blessed, our hearts are changed, and we will support God's ministry at Immanuel. Your abundant support has resulted in our offerings exceeding expenses, enabling us to grow our support of partner ministries, and enter into this new year with health and hope. Thank you, and may your generosity continue to be a blessing to you and help you grow in faith.

Even as we eagerly wait for some semblance of normalcy to return, I am grateful for the ways we have been able to be the body of Christ together. I am blessed to serve with an amazing, dedicated, talented, and caring staff. I am grateful each day to work with Pastor Angela, Martin, Paul, Clark, Tammy, Grace, MaryKay, Terrie, Jeong, Darrell, Kari, and Dave, and all those who help lead our ministry efforts. I give special thanks to Kim and Cindy whose past work is so greatly appreciated, may God bless them as they pursue new endeavors. Please join me in keeping these servants lifted in prayer in the coming year.

Finally, it is an incredible blessing to serve as your Pastor. Thank you for the support, prayers, love, and encouragement you share with me every day! It is in sharing God's love that we not only endure, we overcome!

Loving God and One Another

Together as we walk in faithfulness, we are nurtured through relationships with God through worship and care for each other through gracious welcome & hospitality together and apart. Amidst the continued and on-going crisis of the pandemic, we shared hopes and fears, prayers and dreams through faith-filled conversation, as well as pastoral care through tending to communal trauma, grief/bereavement, crisis, and personal counseling. Together we experienced God's transforming work through love and care of one another during difficult times.

Intentional Faith Development & Expression

We explored and deepened our faith together through study, conversations, and dwelling in scripture together. During the winter, we gathered via Zoom for the book studies *Virus as a Summons to Faith* by Walter Bruggemann, *God and the Pandemic* by N.T. Wright, a study on Thessalonians during Lent, and the 8th Grade Stepping Stone on relationships & sexuality. During the spring we gathered via Zoom for "REjoicing in our Ministry Partners" series. During the fall we continued with REfuel messages, and began the Genesis to Revelation year-long study of scripture. Ever pivoting during the pandemic, we extended the invitation for creative worship opportunities indoors and outdoors, including the amazing All-Community Mural "Behold, I Make All Things New" (with pastor/artist Paul Oman of Drawn to the Word), Lenten individual/family communion, Ash Wednesday ashes outdoors, Lenten healing service, the Prayer Labyrinth, Palm Sunday processional worship around Round Lake, and Maundy Thursday reading of the passion story around campfires, outdoor summer worship (10:30), and the Blessing of the Animals.

Active Service in the Community

Through the preaching and teaching of God's calling and sending of all the saints, we continue to encourage God-inspired action and fearless love within our faith community and into the world. We deepened conversations with clergy/synodical colleagues, our mission partner Cristo Obrero, and with particular focus around white privilege and racial justice awareness.

Practicing Transformative Generosity

As pastors, with God's help, we hope to model and encourage all at Immanuel towards practicing transformative generosity through preaching, teaching, and equipping the saints. Personally, my stewarding of time/talent/treasure includes devotions & prayer, centering prayer group, sabbath, faithful giving, spiritual direction, clergy coaching, continuing education, and balancing part-time work (¾ time/school year, ½ time/summer) with family life and a pastor husband!

2022 Vision

In the coming year, these values inspire me to continue to focus on faithfully re-imagining ministry in a post-pandemic world. On developing my own leadership formation, I will embark on a sabbatical during January/February, and continue focused training/development through the cohort of facilitators through Leaderwise's SHAPE/adaptive leadership retreats.

Throughout our ministry together, I continue to pray that Jesus would continue to make himself known to us through the water and word, through bread and wine, and that God would continue to bless us, the body of Christ here at Immanuel/"God with us". In closing, my GPS blessing: God, go before us, to prepare and provide, and sustain and surprise us with the Holy Spirit! Amen.

I am so honored to call Immanuel my church home for the last 27 years and to be the church administrator for the last 5 years. I appreciate the trust and support this congregation places in me to manage the daily financial matters and oversee the facilities.

In 2021, we settled into the reality of operating church in a new normal, where Covid is ongoing, variants emerge, vaccines and boosters are available to many but not all. Our church taskforce weighed all the latest information and tried to make the best policies to continue worship, funerals, faith formation and community service safe for our members and community. This fall Wed Night Confirmation, Adult Faith Formation, Choirs and Sunday School met in person. However there still are no Wed night meals, Sunday coffee hour or Thanksgiving pie. We held gatherings around fire pits outside and our Sunday morning Contemporary service took place outdoors in the backyard covered by a sunshade, shade trees and umbrellas. - The 1st and 5th grade Stepping Stones will resume in January, 2022.

- In July we bid farewell to Cindy Paulson as our Director of Children's and Family Ministry as she accepted a position at Advent Lutheran, Maple Grove. Cindy's rich experience and gifts in ministry were a blessing and we wish her well in her next ministry setting.
- In July we welcomed Grace Porter as our interim Children's Ministry staff and then in September welcomed Grace as our Director of Children's & Family Ministry. We are so blessed and grateful to have Grace, a member of our congregation and graduate of Augsburg University, to step into this ministry position enabling a smooth and seamless transition. We are truly blessed and grateful to welcome Grace into this position!
- In December we said farewell to Lori Hanken as our Director of Holy Commotion. Lori's

Social Ministry

Kim Rathjen, Coordinator of Outreach

For a second year Immanuel's service and justice ministries have been impacted and altered because of the pandemic. Serving in person was impacted as many of our partner ministries did not ask for in person volunteers in order to mitigate exposure for people being served and those serving. However, the Immanuel community continued to care and serve our neighbors through:

- Providing catered meals to Cornerstone Shelter residents once a month
- Providing groceries and catered meals to Families Moving Forward Families in February and May.
- 135 Personal Care Kits being assembled by individuals and families during Lent 2021
- 3519 pounds of food donated to PROP, plus 600+ jars of pasta sauce for the Summer Food for Kids program, 1528 lbs of produce from our Disciples Garden, an Ash Wednesday Fill the Van food drive, the Thanksgiving Food Drive and weekly donations
- The collection of over \$3000 worth of school supplies for Prairie View Elementary to support over 100 children
- Sending financial support to Loaves and Fishes and Simpson Shelter in lieu of sending volunteers to cook and serve meals
- A successful Coat Drive for Loaves and Fishes
- Habitat for Humanity and Little Dresses continuing with safety protocols
- An Intergenerational Service Event resulting in 60 LWR personal Care Kits, 50 LWR School Kits, and 200 sandwiches for The Sandwich Project
- Sponsorship of 28 individuals for Christmas through LSS Rezek House and Cornerstone, and supporting Holiday Giving programs with gifts cards totaling \$3175 for PROP, RCFL and Salem Lutheran.
- Mitten tree donations given to the Prop Shop for distribution to clients
- The addition of supporting Redeemer Lutheran's efforts to support a neighborhood food shelf by providing a supply of diapers each month beginning in June.

The continued work of learning about and understanding God's justice and how it relates to serving our neighbor included:


- Online meetings around the topic of advocacy including meeting with Minneapolis Area Synod Staff on the topic of Creation Care

Congregational Report 2021

Thank you for being a Partner Congregation! We've nearly made it through another pandemic year! I remain grateful and inspired by the work and support of so many people who've continued to rally around this ministry in order that others should experience fellowship in community and come to know Jesus in these beautiful outdoor spaces. We couldn't have made it without the help from donors, prayer warriors, government pandemic programs, retreat guests, day visitors, campers, lively young adult summer staff, our local business banking and CPA offices, our Polk and Cook County health departments, congregations, and you! Special thanks goes out to our staff who exhibit flexibility and creativity as we continue to adapt to the changing Covid landscape.

2021 was challenging, but filled with bright spots. I expect much of the same for 2022 – exciting ministry opportunities, uncertainties about our participant numbers, continued health and safety Covid protocols, challenging budget needs, dynamic initiatives, challenging seasonal staff hiring environment, and more. We are poised to welcome these challenges and opportunities with grace, wisdom, humility and joy! We have good work to do.

Summer 2021 We were so grateful to bring back summer camp at all three of our sites with strong Covid protocols in place. Due to the nature of the way groups move in and out, Wilderness was able to run canoe trips at their normal level. Wapo and Ox Lake reduced camper capacity to about 40-44% and thankfully an unusually dry summer allowed us to do all normal camp activities outside – including meals. Our summer staff was outstanding! Their incredible level of energy and ability to be flexible gave kids a camp experience that felt "normal". Camp was much needed after a year into the pandemic and we expect this feeling to continue into 2022.

Retreats and Events in 2021 Keeping strong Covid protocols in place we were able to host retreat groups at Wapo and Wilderness this fall and into the winter months. Rigorous cleaning and disinfecting protocols continue at all sites as well as masking in public areas. Special events continued with an adapted approach for the Memorial Day Breakfast and Advent on the Go but we were able to run a full Boat-in Worship season and Wapo golf tournament.

New Faces We welcomed Liz Bowman on Oct 18, 2021 as our Director of Food Services at Wapo and Eric Klein on Nov 1, 2021. Eric joins the program team with responsibilities for Wapo Seeds, Boat-In, Family Camp, and programmed retreats.

Wilderness Give to the Max Wilderness Canoe Base received a \$40,000 gift match for the GiveMN Give to the Max day. On November 18th, friends of WCB met that match, raising just over \$80,000 in one day for Wilderness Canoe Base.

The Gather Campaign for a new Dining Hall and Hospitality Center Our Site and Facilities crew will be finishing up Phase 1 of the Gather project this winter while development staff and campaign committee have begun feasibility interviews to determine the scope of Phase 2 to finish the project. We are incredibly grateful for the support we have received to be able to complete phase 1 with the funds we had already raised. Now as we live into this building and determine the needs for finishing the project, we are excited to make final plans in 2022 for what the completed building will look like. Please prayerfully consider how you might be able to financially support this important project as we continue to raise funds for Phase 2. See building progress at lakewapo.org.

Strategic Plan Initiative. This fall we began Strategic Initiative work with the Joshua Group. We launched a camp impact survey and started individual interviews with staff, Board, and friends of the organization. This strategic work will help us be aligned for meaningful and transformative ministry in an ever-changing ministry landscape.

Our theme for 2022 is "Take Hold" John 16:33 says, ""I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." This summer we will explore what it means for roots of faith to take hold of the soil around us, as the soil takes hold of us. We know Jesus changed everything when he conquered the world for all. He gives us his peace even when the world gives us trouble, and helps us to see how God's love changed everything for all people. Join us as we Take Hold of this promise.

We look ahead with eager anticipation and a sure sense of hope.
